Our service became available in June 2008 with support from the United Ways of NH, Public Service of New Hampshire, the State of New Hampshire as well as various other contributors.

By simply dialing 3 numbers, 2-1-1, people residing anywhere within the state are connected with a professionally certified information and referral specialist who will take the time to listen to the caller and help them determine the type of assistance needed. In turn, the caller will be provided referrals targeted to his/her specific needs. Service organizations- like yours- receive only appropriate referrals and are able to identify community needs based on our call center data.

<u>603 Legal Aid</u> (formerly NH Pro Bono Referral Program and Legal Advice & Referral Center) 603 Legal Aid streamlines access to civil legal aid with a single point of entry. After assessing financial eligibility and identifying the issue, 603 Legal Aid will connect individuals with the appropriate information, resources, and organizations. If an individual requires representation, 603 Legal Aid may provide direct representation, referrals to a volunteer attorney through our pro bono program or to New Hampshire Legal Assistance (NHLA). Collectively, 603 Legal Aid and NHLA serve a client population with incomes up to 250% of the federal poverty level, depending on the type of case. And 603 Legal Aid and NHLA work exclusively with clients facing civil legal issues - not criminal cases. These issues include: rental housing and home ownership; domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and human trafficking; family law; public benefits; utilities; consumer issues; IRS problems; older adults; and youth.

The Chase Home

Residential Treatment Services: The Chase Home residential facility is licensed by the State of New Hampshire to provide residential treatment for up to 18 at-risk male and female youth. These adolescents cannot live at home for a variety of reasons. Residential Treatment Services include behavior modification interventions, individual, family, and group therapy, psychoeducational groups, family outreach, along with educational and independent focused interventions. The length of stay for residential services varies depending on an individual's treatment, but on average is six months. Placements range from 24-hours to two to three weeks. All residents receive fully integrated program services. As an Intermediate Level Residential Treatment Program, The Chase Home focuses on community-based interventions. All residents attend a public school determined by their referring districts. Additionally, all therapeutic services including medication management and individual therapy are provided by the community mental health agency. Medical services are completed within the community. All residents must receive a wellness exam within thirty days of their placement. Residential Services provide youth a place to live to help them develop the skills necessary to stabilize across multiple settings. Through learning the acquired independent living skills and mental health interventions residents can reintegrate back into the local communities.

Independent Living Program: The Independent Living Program (ILP) is a part of our Residential Program that allows more freedom and independence for the resident. We have four ILP suites with a shared living room and kitchenette area. Youth are required to maintain a job and save a portion of their income, keep their living space clean, and to always keep staff informed of their whereabouts. The ILP allows youth the ability to make their own schedule, budget and save their money, and prepare for living on their own. ILP residents work closely with the Independent Living Coordinators to ensure they are following programmatic responsibilities and maintaining safety.

Home-Based Program: Home-Based Program services offered through The Chase Home support youth transitioning from our residential program to reunify with their families or acts as a preventative intervention to avoid residential placement services. Our two programs include the Intensive Service Option (ISO) and Home-Based Therapy (HBT). ISO services allow for the clinician to meet with the family two to three times per week depending on the client's needs. These interventions include crisis management and individual and family interventions using psychoeducation and client-centered interventions. Additionally, ISO allots for a guaranteed tenday respite bed with 24-hour care. HBT allows for clinicians to meet with client and family once per week within the home or local community to support family dynamics of high-risk youth. The Seacoast Community Diversion Program: The Seacoast Community Diversion Program (SCDP) is a State Accredited Court Diversion Program. Youth ages 12-18 that have been charged with a misdemeanor level offense such as possession of marijuana, assault, criminal threatening, etc. are eligible for diversion instead of court. The program is roughly twelve weeks but may be extended on a case-by-case basis. An individualized contract is developed for each youth with the aid of the participant, their parent(s)/guardian(s), the SCDP Coordinator, and the Contract Committee. This is a voluntary participation program. If the youth choose to not complete it or break their contract agreements, the case is referred to the Juvenile Prosecutor to bring to court. If the juvenile successfully completes the program the case is not brought to court, and they avoid having a juvenile record.

ACT is comprised of transportation providers, human service agencies, health care providers, municipalities, planning commissions, and one citizen member. Community Care Team (CCT)

The Community Care Team (CCT) is a group of community agencies, providers, and organizations who often provide services to shared clients. Community Partners

Community Partners is the state designated Community Mental Health Center and Area Agency for Developmental Services in Strafford County.

Community Partners serves those who experience emotional distress, mental illnesses, substance use disorders, developmental disabilities, chronic health needs, acquired brain disorder, as well as those who are in need of information and referral to access long-term supports and services. Most of our developmental programs and administrative functions are located in our Dover office. Other offices are located throughout Strafford County for behavioral health, ServiceLink and other developmental program offerings.

► Developmental Services

Early Supports and Services: providing developmental supports and therapy services to eligible children birth to age three years, who have special developmental needs, delays or disabilities. Family Support: Our Family Support team provides invaluable services and supports to the families of individuals with disabilities, including respite, recreation, in-home support, and transition from school to work and/or adult services.

Partners in Health: assisting families who have a child with chronic health conditions. Services provided include identifying needs, connecting families to resources, respite, collaboration with schools, and more.

Spectrum Connection: Strafford County's first autism clinic. This is a fee for service intervention program provided by a Board Certified Behavior Analyst for children and adults with behavioral challenges, autism or other developmental needs.

•Developmental Service Programs

These programs are available to individuals funded by a Medicaid waiver (Developmental Disabilities (DD) and Acquired Brain Disorder (ABD)). Please call us to find out more. Community Participation Services: meaningful day programming for adults, including vocational activities, creative arts, wellness, and life skills development. Services can also

include educational, recreational, social and functional skill acquisition activities for adults who either live with their families or on their own.

Case Management: coordinating developmental services and supports and helping adult consumers become active participants in their communities.

Participant Directed and Managed Services: self-directed programs for individuals who have a developmental disability or acquired brain disorder.

Residential Services: assisting adults with disabilities to meet their living needs while offering the opportunity for full community participation.

•**Supported Employment**: vocational services, including assistance with applications, resume writing, interviewing, and placement in meaningful and often times, paid positions.

In Home Supports: serves families who have extensive needs for their child with a disability and allows families to put together a plan that addresses the needs of their child in different areas of care. Budgets can include money for personal care, respite, recreation, therapies, consultations and environmental modifications

Respite Services: provides short-term care for a person with a developmental disability who lives at home with his or her family. Respite gives family members time to rest, recharge, and renew their energy without worry or interruption.

► Behavioral Health Services

Youth, Family and Adult Services: offering mental health services for children, teens, adults and families, including individual, family and group therapy, community based functional support services, psychiatry, nursing, medication monitoring and case management.

Emergency Services: available 24 hours a day, every day, to provide crisis support services, including emergency assessment, phone consultation, and referral to mental health services. Choices for Independent Living: A home and community-based program funded by Medicaid, providing a wide range of services designed to help eligible individuals remain in their own homes, as an alternative to a skilled nursing facility. Community Partners is a designated Case Management provider for this program.

► ServiceLink

No Wrong Door access to all Community Partners services. In addition, ServiceLink offers long term supports, services and information for the elderly, physically disabled, as well as family caregiver supports, regarding Medicare and Medicaid.

Referral Education Assistance and Prevention (REAP) : a free program that is available on a short term basis for elders who are experiencing difficulty in their daily living but do not meet state eligibility criteria. It is designed to help older adults regain control of their lives, to live happy, healthy and independent lifestyles. REAP provides free, confidential counseling and educational services to help people better understand and deal with the many life changes they encounter in their older years.

The mission of CPSC is to promote health, wellness, and hope-based recovery for those struggling with mental health issues, by providing a safe environment for self-reflection and education using Intentional Peer Support, and a variety of groups and opportunities to support self-determination and empowerment. All services are free and do not require a referral.

CPSC provides an alternative and/or complement to traditional treatments for mental health issues, whether acute or chronic. There are no therapists or other providers at CPSC. Instead, staff have "lived experience" of their own which provides the foundation for peer support to be an essential element of the success of the center. There is no judgment or attempts to give advice or fix the other. We all learn together and share those insights, supporting each other during the difficult passages.

We have recovery-oriented groups in which support and encouragement are essential to the participant's goals of moving toward what they want in life. Examples include nutrition, stretch and balance, stress management, journaling, mindfulness, painting, advocacy and outreach, and anger management. We also have Intentional Peer Support Groups and WRAP which assists participants in creating their own Wellness Recovery Action Plan.

Our peer-supported Warmline is available 7 days a week, from 5pm–10 pm, at 603 427 6966. Whether you are having a great day and wish to share that with someone, having a rough day and need support, or just want to check in, we are here to listen.

We eliminate that problem by offering 3-4 opportunities per day to practice skill usage with the group or individually.We provide parents or an adult partner with their own skills coach who can help the adults in a teen's life better understand their teen's emotional needs and become more skilled responders to their child

Our goal is to offer teens and families the guidance and support they need to be successful. We believe the best way to do this is through short bursts of treatment every day so that they can master the content over the course of three months. •Seacoast Pathways

A supportive, accredited, community-based non-profit program for adults living with mental illness or acquired brain injuries. Seacoast Pathways is a structured evidence-based recovery program for adults 18 and over living with mental illness (and co-occurring substance use disorders) or an acquired brain injury who strive to re-engage with others and the community. The program follows the Clubhouse International Model of Psychosocial Rehabilitation and provides opportunities to utilize strengths, interests, and skill development to get back on track for employment, education, improved housing, and wellness – all hallmarks of mental health and brain injury recovery.

Participants, called members, work side-by-side with staff to operate the 'clubhouse' and volunteer for clerical work, reception, lunch preparation, and planning and organizing activities. Art, music, writing, and nutrition are incorporated for after hour socials or 'lunch and learn' activities. Members are actively supported in their employment, housing, and educational goals by increasing skills, pursuing resources, and finding fellowship with others.

To become a member, call or email us to schedule a visit and tour. New members need a confidential referral from a clinician and will meet with a staff member for orientation. After this, the diagnosis is "left at the door" and the individual starts the exciting work of reaching their goals.

CRN Spring Meeting 40 March 22, 2024 **Residential treatment for pregnant and parenting women with a substance use disorder**: Keystone Hall's Cynthia Day Family Center in Nashua is one of a very few residential facilities in New England catering to the specific needs of pregnant and parenting women who experience a substance use disorder *and* their families. We're committed to providing a safe space for this vulnerable cohort and their families to recover from substance use disorder. We provide in-house childcare while clients are in treatment, removing a persistent barrier many people encounter when they seek help.

With recent renovations to the facility, Cynthia Day Family Center now has more beds reserved for pregnant and parenting moms than any non-profit operating in the state. Because of this commitment to serving this target population, we also offer more treatment modalities that are specific to traumas they or their children may have encountered.

Our dedicated staff is made up of Master's level clinicians, counselors, and recovery coaches who understand the need for a safe space to recover from drug or alcohol use and provide individual and group counseling either in a residential setting or on an outpatient basis to meet clients' needs and allow them to move between levels of care, as needed. We also offer specialized nurturing parenting groups, family therapy, peer support and relapse prevention groups with women in mind.

In addition, Harbor Care is licensed to provide medication assisted treatment to clients using a variety of FDA-approved prescriptions to curb withdrawal symptoms and allow clients to focus on underlying psychological issues that may be driving their addictions.

With a steady rise in stimulant use throughout New Hampshire, Harbor Care also provides the only evidence-based treatment for this classification of drug in the state.

Our staff will provide transportation to and from appointments and aftercare case management, including referral and coordination of other necessary services. Understanding our pregnant and parenting mom clients also means developing connections to other social service organizations that may help clients once they leave our facility.

Our integrated care model also means clients enrolled in our residential facility may access additional medical or psychological care that simply doesn't exist at other agencies. Clients and their young children benefit from this model, often receiving dental care or primary care while they are also addressing their substance use disorder.

Our 66-bed residential treatment center in Nashua combines primary and mental health care with short- and long-term substance use disorder treatment and recovery support services and our services are completely confidential. HAVEN is the largest violence prevention and support services agency in the state, dedicated to the prevention of sexual assault, domestic violence, stalking and human trafficking while supporting and empowering women, men, youth, families and people of all marginalized genders and identities, to heal from abuse and rebuild their lives. HAVEN serves 48 cities and towns in Southeastern NH with offices in Portsmouth and Rochester, as well as an emergency shelter in a confidential location.

HAVEN advocates provide free, confidential, 24-hour support via our hotline; in-person support at hospitals, courts, police departments, and Child Advocacy Centers: support groups, safety planning, education and resources for survivors, their families, and the community. Per RSA 165, every city and town in NH has an individual or elected body who is designated to be the administrator of general assistance in that town. It is the right, by law, of any individual to make an application for assistance. The objective of the welfare officer is to assist individuals in their town, in accordance with NH Law and the Welfare Guidelines adopted by that town, who are temporarily unable to provide for their own documented shelter, food, medication, utility, or other emergency need. All funding for the Welfare Departments is provided from local property taxes. The welfare administrator will leverage existing resources and explore avenues to maintain costs, while simultaneously meeting their clients' needs, by working closely with federal, state, and local agencies and charities to maximize services and benefits to their clients. Lydia's House of Hope

Lydia's House of Hope in Somersworth, NH is a program for women and their children. **We do not allow men in our program**. The program requires a 12-month commitment and helps to empower women to be self-sufficient, find a job, enroll in school, and/or learn life skills such as cooking, parenting, and emotional regulation.

There is weekly mandatory programing on Mondays and Wednesdays from 7am-3pm. Additionally, there is required programing scheduled late mornings on Fridays and Saturday mornings some weeks in the month.

Our residents receive weekly counseling and work directly with a case manager to create a plan while they're in the program of goals as well as their after care plan. We create individualized plans based on the needs of the woman, this could include one on one meetings outside of the program as needed. We are a substance-free facility and perform random drug screens.

If someone is currently struggling with substance use issues, we do require that they fully complete a 28-day program before applying for our program and we would need proof of the successful completion. Program applicants must be highly motivated to change their life, willing to work with us to achieve their goals and be an active participant in their plan for the 12-months they are here.

Conditions:

•There is a \$300/monthly rent fee upon acceptance and admission; there is also a \$300/security deposit for the room, which results in \$600/move-in cost.

•We require that residents are at least 18 years of age.

•We do not provide transportation, typically CTS and public transportation is utilized.

•Women share a room with their children, limiting the amount of belongings and storage available.

•Domestic Violence situations: current domestic dispute between the applicant and their spouse/partner, active restraining orders, or otherwise unsafe relationships that they may or may not be fleeing, does not necessarily disqualify them from the program, but it will be a thorough discussion before a decision on their acceptance is made to ensure that our home for the other women remains a safe and secure place.

aware that barbiturates, benzodiazepines, opioids, and narcotics, prescribed or not, are not allowed in the home and will result in an immediate denial of acceptance. If an applicant is on a maintenance substance, this will be discussed during the interview process; it does not necessarily disqualify them from the program.

After all of the above steps are completed, the team discusses the applicant to decide if it would be a good fit. The process typically takes about a week from start to finish depending on applicant availability for the screens and interview.

REAP - Referral Education Assistance Prevention Program

The Referral Education Assistance & Prevention (REAP) program has been established to support older adults in the community to maintain and improve quality of life and support independence. The REAP program puts emphasis on the problem of substance misuse and abuse and the identification of early signs of mental health and cognitive problems among older adults living in New Hampshire. The REAP Program, provides prevention education, referrals, support and related services to assist eligible individuals with concerns about substance abuse/misuse, including prescription and over-the-counter medications, mental and cognitive health, and identifying issues that interfere with achieving a better quality of life.

The program is state-wide, state funded, confidential and free to eligible individuals. Clients can be seen in their home, the community or the REAP counselor's office location. The program is administered by Seacoast Mental Health Center. Across the state of New Hampshire, REAP counselors work out of the 10 regional mental health centers. • Eligibility: Adult over the age of 60, Care partner for an adult over the age of 60, Professional/organizations who works with older adults (including senior housing managers and service coordinators), and disabled persons living in Senior Housing who live in NH.

Additionally, the program offers:

- Education Sessions. Education sessions are conducted by REAP counselors and are held in senior housing complexes, community centers, and other places where older adults gather in the community.
- Technical Assistance. Technical assistance is offered when an area professional contacts a REAP counselor for assistance and guidance in dealing with specific elderly issues. I.E. a housing manager may notice some recent changes in a resident's disposition, increased isolation, agitation or sudden weight loss, and may not know if or how to approach his/her concern with the resident. The REAP Counselor can brainstorm a way to approach the resident regarding the concerns while respecting the persons privacy. He or she might introduce the idea of a "friendly visit" by the REAP counselor who could assess the situation further. Thus, technical assistance may facilitate counseling referrals when appropriate.

The Rockingham Community Action Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program brings individuals and families with household annual incomes up to \$58,000 Free Tax Preparation services. Taxes are prepared by IRS-certified volunteers who assist low-to-moderate income residents of the state to access the greatest amount of refunds.

Some important changes individuals will see this year include:

• An expansion of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) for those without a child to claim; the expansion increases the age range to allow workers age 65+ and those as young as age 19 to claim this support for low-income working people.

• The Child Tax Credit was increased, and many people raising children received advance payments totaling up to half of the full credit. Those who got the advance payments or who missed out on them can file a tax return to claim the full amount for which they are eligible.

• A change to the Dependent Care Tax Credit can mean as much as \$8,000 for those who paid for childcare or home care that allowed them to work or look for work.

The EITC is a support for working people who don't make a lot of money. According to the IRS, about 1-in-4 eligible New Hampshire residents fail to file for the EITC, leaving an estimated \$49 million unclaimed.

•Fuel Assistance/ Electric Assistance Programs: Fuel Assistance benefits from \$\$243 to \$2,419 may be available to homeowners or renters during the winter heating season. Eligibility and benefit amounts are determined by GROSS household income for a 30-day period, household size, and annual heating costs. Some income is counted back 365 days. Our Portsmouth Adult Education Program provides quality classroom-based instruction for adults in need of improving basic skills for new or better jobs, or to enter college or certificate programs. Our counselors assist each adult by defining goals related to family, employment and postsecondary education and then support them through classes to reach those goals. With offices in Portsmouth and Exeter, SMHC is one of ten NH state-designated community mental health centers. University of New Hampshire Dao Research Lab

The Dao Research Lab is a part of the Department of Agriculture, Nutrition, and Food Systems at UNH. Given the complexities of nutrition, weight management, and human health, our research considers biological, psychosocial, cultural, and environmental determinants of health. We aim to better understand the impacts of these factors on the gut microbiome, weight status, and access to nutrient-rich foods with special attention to minority populations in NH. We follow a Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR) approach and seek to work alongside community stakeholders so that our research can support the ongoing public health efforts in New Hampshire. As a relatively new lab (2020), we are eager to build new community connections so that we can best support minority health in New Hampshire. Each chapter is stand alone with an individual Board of Directors. There are times chapters will work together to assist a community member with a financial request. The amount of money they contribute is typically around \$500 and may vary per each chapter.

There is currently not a chapter in the Dover area. There has been talk but it has not been pulled together yet.
